



Development and Affordable Housing Program, and by Wells Fargo

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

- Innovative native organizations increasing housing built on native lands
- Learn & apply best practices for managing housing development
- Emphasis on leveraging IHBG/NHHBG



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THE Academy Results

- THE Academy has been held twice to date
 - 30 staff from 15 organizations have graduated
 - 101 homes built or rehabilitated
 - 72 homes under construction or rehabilitation
 - \$8 million secured in expanded federal funding to leverage IHBG
 - \$13.8 million in non-federal \$ and LIHTC equity



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Goals of THE Academy

At the end of the 30-month period, all participating organizations as a group will achieve:

- 140 housing units in the development process
- 28 housing units rehabbed or built
- \$1.4 million in non-HUD financing
- \$700,000 of new/expanded federal funding

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



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Your Commitment



- Two staff attend all trainings, complete homework, work on the housing project
- Request and utilize coaching, TA
- Submit reports
- Travel costs in excess of \$4,000 reimbursement

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Selection Criteria

Organizational Readiness:

- Good operating history, organizational systems in place
- Supportive board of commissioners/directors and executive staff
- Commitment to housing development
- Developed housing in the past 5 years, and attempted to leverage funding beyond NAHASDA

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Selection Criteria

Project Readiness:

- Feasible housing development or housing rehabilitation project(s) identified
- Site control is a threshold for eligibility
- Organizations identifying projects with advanced readiness to proceed will receive higher consideration.
- Projects in Opportunity Zones will receive higher consideration

- Letter of commitment in support of the project, and the applicant's participation.
 - From Board/Council by October 7
- Eligibility Map for the organization or project from website, and maybe a second map

 - Brief organizational history of the partner
 - Accomplishments/Prior development projects
 - Name, contact information and brief bio of the partner lead
 - Description of the roles of the applicant and the partner
 - Signed MOU or development agreement between the applicant and the partner


